

The MAPsack Project's mandate is to create nature-themed backpacks that provide the resources and inspiration for families throughout Leeds and Grenville to get outside, explore and have fun in nature.




Where do I get a MAPSack?





The MAPSacks are available at any one of the Leeds & Grenville Public Libraries.

- 40 Nature themed backpacks rotate through 13 Public Library Systems (24 branches).
- Each library system decides on lending policy.
- Circulation statistics show the MAPSacks check out on average 10 times a year.

- Books
- Gear
- Field Notebook

The Checklist makes it easy for families to keep track of what's in the bag and return all of the pieces.




Nature literacy with MAP




