
Share the Road envisions a future in which Ontario is the most bicycle friendly place in North America.

Significant progress on CycleON Action Plan 1.0 (all actions underway)

Building Cycling Infrastructure

- Advocacy for \$200 million for cycling infrastructure under Climate Change Action Plan
- \$150 to \$225 million for cycling infrastructure included in the Climate Change Action Plan (2016-2020)
- Letters of support from 18 Mayors to roll out funding in 2017
- Cycling partners called on province to include \$50 million for cycling infrastructure in 2017 budget
- Letter of support signed by 51 municipal elected officials
- \$50 million in 2017 budget, additional funding details just released







Ontario Municipal Commuter Cycling Program

- Four year program, \$42.5 million in year one, future funding dependent on availability of cap and trade proceeds
- All Ontario municipalities eligible, up to 80% of project costs, application deadline is August 18th, 2017
- Two streams: medium and large municipalities (>15,000) and small municipalities (<15,000)
- Medium/large: based on a funding formula, must have cycling plan
- Small: up to \$25,000, cycling plan not a requirement







Stakeholder Survey

The momentum in Ontario has been towards a more bicycle-friendly province over the past 3 years (95% of respondents)



Top Provincial Priorities



Annual infrastructure funding (82%)



Education (66%+)



Biggest missed opportunity: construction/re-development of roads without cycling provisions

Future infrastructure funds should have different categories/criteria depending on community size and location




Stakeholder Survey

Resulting Actions from Share the Road

- Met with staff in the offices of the Premier, Minister of Transportation, Minister of Environment & Climate Change and Minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport to share results and celebrate momentum
- Successful advocacy to see \$50 million in provincial funding for cycling infrastructure in 2017
- Cycling infrastructure funding does take municipal size into account
- Letter to the Minister of Transportation regarding inclusion of construction costs of cycling infrastructure on provincial highways crossings and interchanges
- Launch of awareness campaign & education pilot project

1m Awareness Campaign













- To date, more than **3.1 million impressions** for the campaign, including
 - Horizon Travel Magazine (100,000)
 - 10 second clip in Dundas Square
 - 5 second clip on 10 PATH screens
 - Print ad on packaging of 10,000 lights
 - Print ad on Muskoka Cycling Map
 - 12,000+ views through Facebook
 - Niagara Public Health screening at vaccination clinics
 - Display opportunities in <u>your community</u>...
- Resources available for free to all municipal and cycling partners, we want to get this information out to all road users!
- Aim to pool resources for provincial messaging, local stakeholders focus on distribution & engagement
- Opportunities for future awareness campaigns

CycleON Action Plan 1.0

- CycleON: Ontario's Cycling Strategy (2013) being implemented over 20 years through a series of multi-year Action Plans
- Action Plan 1.0 launched in 2014 with 34 actions, some with hard deadlines, others are ongoing
- Analysis in October 2016 identified all 34 actions either underway or completed
- Launch Action Plan 2.0 consultations in 2017, maintain the momentum





2017 Ontario Bike Summit

- 9th Annual summit the largest to date with 290 delegates (26% increase)
- 32 speakers exploring "Just Add Bikes"
- Keynote addresses delivered by The Honourable Eleanor McMahon and the Honourable Steven Del Duca, Todd Scott from Detroit Greenways and Julie Sawchuk from Huron County
- Members of Queen's Park All-Party Cycling Caucus at keynote dinner, including 5 members of Cabinet
- Two youth Emcees representing CultureLink Canada
- Bike tour of local infrastructure led by City of Toronto staff

Key Findings

- Demand for shorter courses that teach people what they want to know about cycling
- More promotion is needed that highlights the value of CAN-BIKE courses for residents of all ages
- National support for instructors and local delivery partners is key to growing the program
- Identifying specific audiences for training and targeting them through customized marketing is also key
- Limited national resources to maintain program or support growth

Next Steps: Cycling Education

- Funding through Ontario150 for Share the Road to provide provincial support, including:
 - Training up to 10 new instructors
 - Identifying partners, scheduling courses, coordinating course logistics
 - Providing a low cost alternative at \$35/student for 4 hour course (largely thanks to reduced insurance rates provided by Cycling Canada)
 - Developing, distributing and analyzing evaluation tools to all interested partners





Next Steps: Cycling Education

- Pilot Objectives:
 - Evaluation retention of information, testing new course curriculum, evaluating new approaches
 - Supporting instructors coordinating courses to create more lucrative job opportunity, reduce volunteer hours/costs
 - Building a sustainable model instructor memberships and course fees paid to Cycling Canada to support program coordination









Why Support a National Program

- Deliver a certified curriculum
- Using some CAN-BIKE resources and not others
- Avoid duplication of efforts and resources on local re-inventions of the curriculum
- Provide feedback instead of starting from scratch
- Enhancing opportunities for feedback join CAN-BIKE Steering Committee
- Focus local efforts/resources on course promotion, delivering free courses, hiring/training new instructors
- A model and course that will outlast an individual or a group
